



Fiscal Year-End Highlights

This past year completed the second year of World Pediatric Project's *Transformation*2023 - Every Child Initiative aimed at accelerating WPP's healing outreach to more children, sooner. The following year-end highlights demonstrate strong progress, made possible by your generous support.

Eastern Caribbean - 1788 individual children reached

(including St. Vincent and the Grenadines, St. Lucia, Dominica, Grenada, St. Kitts and Nevis, Antigua/Barbuda, Anguilla, & Barbados)

- WPP Dedicated Operating Theatre opened enabling the
 deployment of two additional surgery teams to St. Vincent for
 a total of 13 teams, while supporting a higher volume and
 complexity of surgeries. Within the next five years, WPP aspires
 to <u>double</u> the number of children reached annually in the
 Eastern Caribbean region.
- Expansion of WPP Network to Reach More Children Sooner Generous grant funding expanded WPP's patient identification
 network through the establishment of a regional medical
 director and stipend support for WPP community pediatricians
 designated in the high-need WPP partner countries of
 Dominica, Grenada and St. Lucia.
- Launch of Regional Newborn Advanced Medical Care Training Program - The early success of a similar program in St. Vincent and Belize was adapted and launched in Dominica, Grenada and St. Lucia to support skilled medical care response for newborns and babies with urgent care conditions.
- Expansion of Orthopedic Surgical Outreach and Hospital Network - To meet the abundant demand for pediatric orthopedic advanced care, WPP is ramping up deployment of general orthopedic and spine repair specialist teams, resulting in <u>doubling</u> the number of children reached annually to an estimated 1,000 children. WPP added two additional U.S. partner hospitals to its U.S. network, now totaling 13, to care for children requiring the most complex orthopedic surgical corrections.

<u>Dominican Republic</u> - 128 individual children reached

- The 1,000th child received open heart surgery independent of outside assistance since the launch of WPP's pediatric cardiac surgery capacity building program more than a decade ago.
- Charlotte-based Neurosurgery and Spine Associates have led WPP's neurosurgery training program and surgical outreach since 2008, this year completing their 13th mission, reaching a total of 228 children.

9-year-old Albert received a shunt implanted last November in the Dominican Republic to treat his hydrocephalus.



A nearly 4 inch leg length discrepancy impeded 10-year-old Kurrina's life, physically and emotionally. This spring she received the first of two lengthening procedures to provide normal function to this active and growing girl from St. Lucia.


Six-month-old Izabelle was one of 109 children helped by WPP's plastic surgery team in Belize last November. Izabelle received the first phase of cleft lip and palate repair, and will return this fall for the next stage of corrective surgery, which typically requires multiple surgeries.

Honduras - 184 individual children reached

- Pediatric Cardiac Training Program launched, modeled after the successful WPP program in the Dominican Republic.
- Scoliosis/Spine Repair Program launched in San Pedro Sula, reaching children in the northern region of this expansive country as well as training indigenous surgeons. An additional program will be launched in early 2019 in the capital city, Tegucigalpa.

Belize - 544 individual children reached

- **New Surgical Hub** established in the northern end of the country to support reaching <u>more</u> children, sooner.
- Data Access Collaboration Initiative
 established with the Belize Ministry of Health
 supporting early intervention for babies and
 children identified with congenital conditions
 enabling WPP to ultimately reach more
 children sooner.



UVA Medical Center-based pediatric cardiac surgeon Dr. Jay Gangemi and VCU Health System pediatric cardiologist Dr. Scott Gullquist led the first WPP training team to Honduras last October, completing 9 open-heart surgeries, 9 cardiac catheterizations and 26 diagnostic evaluations.



One-year-old Andrea had her tethered spinal cord surgically released in Guatemala City by a visiting pediatric neurosurgery WPP team from St. Louis.

Guatemala - 77 individual children reached

- Craniofacial Surgery Training Program established with
 Guatemalan physicians to advance knowledge and surgical
 skills to care for the significant child population with
 craniofacial malformations. Left untreated, not only is the
 health and functioning of these children compromised, they
 also endure daily discrimination and social stigma given the
 visible nature of these congenital conditions.
- Scoliosis/Spine Repair Program established to meet the large, unmet need of corrective spine surgery for children suffering with debilitating and sometimes life-threatening scoliosis. To date this complex and expertise-dependent surgery has not been performed in the country.



You Make a Difference for a Lifetime

Two-year-old Ana Sophia and her mother, Betty, travelled from Belize to Richmond for her second stage of cranio-facial surgery in May.

Infusing the World With Joy 2-year-old Ana Sophia - Belize

Ana Sophia has never met a stranger, always quick to smile, laugh and hug. Despite her clear facial abnormality due to her congenital conditions, she is clearly a happy and loving child who immediately adds joy to any room she enters.

Ana Sophia was born with a complete cleft lip and palate, an enlarged head, called macrocephaly, and a rare brain condition called agenesis of corpus callosum, which can cause vision problems, motor skill and some cognitive delays. Her mom, Betty, still remembers the doctors in Belize preparing her for the likelihood of Ana Sophia not surviving past two months of age. "They told us to say goodbye."

While Betty and her husband were devastated, they refused to lose hope. Upon being seen by the WPP pediatric plastic surgery team visiting Belize, Betty was ecstatic to learn Ana Sophia could be helped by WPP. "Everyone involved with World Pediatric Project has such big hearts." Throughout their several year medical journey, Betty is grateful for discovering a second family, their WPP family. "Ana Sophia gives them all hugs and kisses. I am so happy my daughter is learning to share and give love, and be thankful for the life she has."

Full of Smiles and Courage 4 1/2-year-old Zionjah - Belize

Zionjah (ZJ) was born with a sacral skin tag, a rare congenital defect resembling a tail. While at first ZJ didn't suffer any neurological or physical discomfort, the social embarrassment escalated, especially once this energetic boy began attending pre-school.

But last fall this changed when ZJ began experiencing pain and difficulty walking. An MRI and evaluation by a WPP team alarmingly discovered a tethered spinal cord, a serious condition which, uncorrected, could cause permanent damage, including paralysis.

WPP coordinated surgery this past spring to correct ZJ's tethered cord. The embarrassing skin tag was also removed with a biopsy confirming it was a benign growth.

Having both procedures accomplished gave ZJ's family great relief. "Our family asked for angels to be sent our way. I now realize all the doctors, nurses, and WPP family are the angels we have been praying for," ZJ's mom wrote in her thank you note to the World Pediatric Project team.



ZJ's mom now dreams with greater optimism about ZJ's future. "I want him to grow up to be kind and give back to others just like he was given to. Maybe he will become a doctor."


